ADMISSION

Admission to Brecksville High School is made in the following ways:

1. Promotion from the sixth grades of the Brecksville - Broadview Heights Public Schools.
2. Written transfer, mailed from another public school, showing the work done and the credits earned.

WITHDRAWAL

Students wishing to withdraw or transfer to other schools report to the Principal's office. The necessary papers will be completed at this time.

ATTENDANCE

Parents are requested to call the school by 12:00 on the first day of each absence period. The school's number is Jackson 6-4371. At this time, arrangements can be made to have the books taken home to the student.

Absence will be excused when the reason for it is justifiable. Legal absence is for illness, quarantine, death or sickness in the family, or medical appointment. Absence for a medical appointment will be valid up to one half day for each appointment. With few exceptions, absences for activities not sponsored by the school system are not valid. Time will be made up if the situation demands.

If there is doubt as to the validity of an absence, inquiry should be made at the attendance office **before** the absence.

A valid excuse permits a pupil to make up the work for credit. For a non-valid absence, zero is given for the work missed. In either case, the absence will be marked against the attendance record.

If a family vacation is going to take a student out of school for more than fifteen days, arrangements must be made for entering another school or for private tutoring during this period.

Upon returning to school, each student must bring from a parent or guardian a written statement which shows the date and cause of absence. It must be presented to the attendance office with a class excuse. If the note from home is forgotten, it is equally important to report to the attendance office. Immediate arrangements should be made to make up work.

If it becomes necessary to leave school, permission must first be obtained from the attendance office before leaving.

This also applies to students who are on their lunch period either at school or the Center. When it is known in advance that it will be necessary to leave school, the student should report to the attendance office before 8:40 of the day of absence.

A student is tardy to school if he is not in his seat when the tardy bell rings for the first period class or home room period. He is tardy to class if he is not in his classroom seat at the end of the second (tardy) bell.

Tardiness will be dealt with at the office.

CURRICULUM REQUIREMENTS

Before a student may graduate, he must present seventeen units of work consisting of two majors and two minors. A major is defined as three years of work in any one field; a minor is two years of work in one field. A field of work would be—English, Math, Science, Commercial, etc.

The three courses of study are:

1. College Preparatory
2. Business Education
3. General

Elective subjects are chosen to conform to the course pursued. Deviations are allowed only with special permission.

CREDITS

All classes that recite one period daily for a year and require outside preparation give one unit of credit.

Classes that meet twice daily for a year also give one unit of credit without outside preparation.

Classes that meet one period daily for a year without outside preparation earn one-half unit of credit.

Part credit will not be given for courses that are not completed.

Seventeen units, including Physical Education are needed for graduation.

HOMEWORK

Preparation outside of class for courses

carried is called homework. Most of this can be done in the scheduled study halls provided only four courses are taken. It will normally take about 45 minutes of outside work for each academic subject carried. Work not done in the study hall should be taken home and completed.

SUBJECT LOAD

A normal High School load is four credits exclusive of quarter credits; half credits in music and 9th grade Art, 9th grade Speech, and 9th grade Journalism also may not be used to complete the normal load.

MAKE UP WORK

Home work, tests, quizzes, etc., may be made up when missed due to certain absences when the excuse is valid. It is the responsibility of the student to find out what work is to be done and complete it. All work must be made up in one half the number of days the student was absent, with the exception that not less than two school days and one weekend is to be allowed.

If a student is absent because of a family vacation, special rules and regulations will apply. (Note Attendance Section.)

HONOR AND MERIT ROLL

At the close of each 6 weeks grading period, the Honor and Merit roll will be published. To be on the honor roll a student must have all "A's" in 1 unit subjects, and all "B's" or better in other than 1 unit subjects. To make

the merit roll, a "B" average is necessary with no grades below a "C". All classes but Phys. Ed. are counted.

GRADING

Subjects are graded as follows: A—Superior, B—Good, C—Average, D—Unsatisfactory but passing, E—Failing. For College recommendation, a student must have a "C" average in the college prep course.

General effort and over all Citizenship are graded O—Outstanding, S—Satisfactory, U—Unsatisfactory. A "U" is given in the citizenship section of the report card for being sent to the office, and other reasons. Before a "U" is given in the Citizenship section for other reasons, a student is usually rated "U" by two or more teachers. If but one teacher rates Citizenship as "U", this is shown in the remarks section of the report card.

REPORT CARDS

The student receives a report card three times during each semester. All report cards except the last one are given out by the home room teacher on the Thursday following the end of the 6 weeks' period.

The student shall take the card to his parents or guardian for signature and is urged to return it the following day. It must be returned the following Monday. Care should be taken that report cards are not lost. Duplicate report cards will be issued upon payment of a 25c fee. Final report cards will not be issued until all fees, fines, books, etc., are cleared. Final report cards will be mailed home.

HOME ROOMS

For the purpose of checking attendance, keeping school records and helping the students in every way, each pupil is assigned to a homeroom. Here he will be given a locker and made to feel a part of a class group.

Homeroom will be held at 8:45 each day. Attendance will be taken, announcements made, printed information passed out and class business conducted at this time.

Homeroom periods for guidance purposes will be held periodically. These are usually held in conjunction with assemblies.

STUDY HALL

The purpose of the Study Hall is set forth in the name. To make the most of it, all books and materials needed should be brought to the Study Hall.

Go directly to the seat assigned and remain there until attendance is taken. The teacher will come to the seat and assign washroom passes as well as other excuse slips.

Only one boy and one girl will be excused at a time to go to the washroom.

There is to be NO talking after the bell rings, except with permission of the Study Hall teacher.

GUIDANCE

The guidance program is designed to give special help to students to help themselves. Basically, each teacher and homeroom teacher is a guidance counselor who can and will do

much to help with social and educational adjustment.

In addition, special guidance helps include tests and individual conferences with the guidance counselors. Testing and guidance programs are set up for each grade.

Students who have a problem or would like a test to measure personality, interest or achievement should come to the guidance office or see the Girl's Counselor for special help.

LIBRARY

The High School Library functions as a separate unit from the Brecksville Public Library. Complete library service is available to Junior and Senior High School from the School Library. It operates as a unit of the County Library and has borrowing privileges from the County Public Library. It will be open from 8:00 - 4:00 each school day. Passes to the library from study hall may be obtained from the subject matter teacher.

Books borrowed from the County Library are to be returned there. Books borrowed from the High School Library are to be returned to it.

No Encyclopedias are available for use outside of the Library.

Quiet and order are to be observed in the Library at all times.

Courteously return all materials used to the proper place. Return books promptly on the date they are due or renew them if you need to use them longer. Keep your fines paid up.

By your cooperation, the Library can be of great service to the entire student body.

WORKING PERMITS

The laws of Ohio require attendance at school until the age of 18 or graduation. Pupils over 16 years of age who have completed the 7th grade may be excused from school only by securing a working permit. A part-time and vacation permit may be issued to pupils over 14 for after school work and summer jobs. To secure a working permit you must first have the promise of a job. Second, you should report to the Principal's Secretary for processing of the proper papers. All work permits are issued from the County office. The Principal's office does the preliminary work as a matter of convenience.

TRANSPORTATION and STUDENT DRIVING

Bus transportation is furnished for all students except those living within the immediate vicinity of the school. Because of lack of parking, all bus students are expected to ride the bus to and from school. Hitch-hiking from school is forbidden.

In cases of necessity, an exception will be made to the bus riding regulation.

When this is done, if a student drives to school, the vehicle driven must be registered through the homeroom or Principal's office.

No student vehicles other than bicycles are to enter the playground after 7:45 a.m. or before the last bus leaves after school unless permission is obtained from the office.

Students are not permitted to enter any cars on or off the school grounds after arriving at school in the morning until after school is out in the afternoon.

No motor vehicles are to be operated on the school grounds at any time unless it is a necessity. In such an event, due caution must be exercised. Speeds over 10 M.P.H. are prohibited.

Student driving on Arlington is prohibited before and after school while buses are loading or unloading.

When it is necessary for parents to bring students to school or pick them up, this should be done in front of the school.

Parking for student vehicles other than bicycles is available at the lot next to the Athletic Field. Bicycles should be parked on the playground. Bicycles are to be walked on and off the playground. Bicycles and other vehicles are not to be used until school is dismissed.

Students are to ride the assigned bus at the assigned time. Bus passes will be issued through the Attendance office when it is necessary to ride a different bus.

SCHOOL DAY

Students in grades 10, 11, 12 should report directly to their first period class at 8:00. Students in grades 7, 8, 9 should report to their homeroom at 8:45.

No student should arrive at school before the first bus transporting his class. For grades 10, 11, 12, this will be about 7:50; for grades

7, 8, 9, this will be about 8:35. Seventh, eighth, and ninth grade students should stay on the playground or in the gym until 8:45.

All students will be in Homeroom from 8:45 to 9:00.

Lunch will begin at 11:15 for Grades 11 and 12, Grade 10 at 11:30, Grade 7 at 11:45, Grade 8 at 12:00, Grade 9 at 12:15. Lunch period will be 30 minutes long for each grade. Lunches may be purchased in the cafeteria.

Grades 10, 11, 12, will be dismissed at 2:45 and grades 7, 8, 9, at 3:35.

COURTESY TO VISITORS

Brecksville School welcomes visitors who desire to learn about the school. A visitor's pass should be obtained from the Principal's office. All students are responsible for courteous behavior to all visitors.

If a student's parents wish to consult with a teacher, an appointment should be arranged through the office of the Principal.

SCHOOL BUILDING and GROUND REGULATIONS

Students in grades 7, 8 and 9 may not leave the school grounds before school, at noon, or after school without a note from home approved by the Principal.

No smoking is permitted in the school or on the school grounds by students at any time. No smoking is permitted within one block of the school during school hours. Failure to abide by this regulation will result in one

week's suspension. Cigarettes and tobacco are not to be brought into the school building by any students.

Under the bleachers and the Lobby are out of bounds except when directed to be used by a teacher.

The student parking lot is out of bounds during school hours. No loitering will be permitted there at any time.

The cooperation of all students is needed to keep the school and grounds neat, clean and attractive. We are judged by our appearance.

CONDUCT at the CENTER

Students are not to go behind the stores, churches, homes or cross private property in the center and vicinity. Those who are permitted to go to the center are reminded that their behavior is a reflection on their family, church, community and school. They are expected to act in a courteous manner and not litter the stores and walks. Reports of violations and misbehavior will result in camping.

HALLS

Students must stay out of the halls during school hours except when passing from class to class.

Rotation in passing during change of classes makes the stairway by the Library an "Up & Down" stairway and the one in the center of the building an "Up" stairway. The stairway by the Gym is used as a "Down" stairway. The South stairway in the old section is to be

used as an "Up" stairway. When coming from the Gym at noon, the North stairway may be used as an "Up" stairway provided upstairs classes are not passing.

TELEPHONE

The pay station phone is in the entrance to the Auditorium. This phone may be used by students before school, at noon, and after school and during the day with permission.

LOST and FOUND

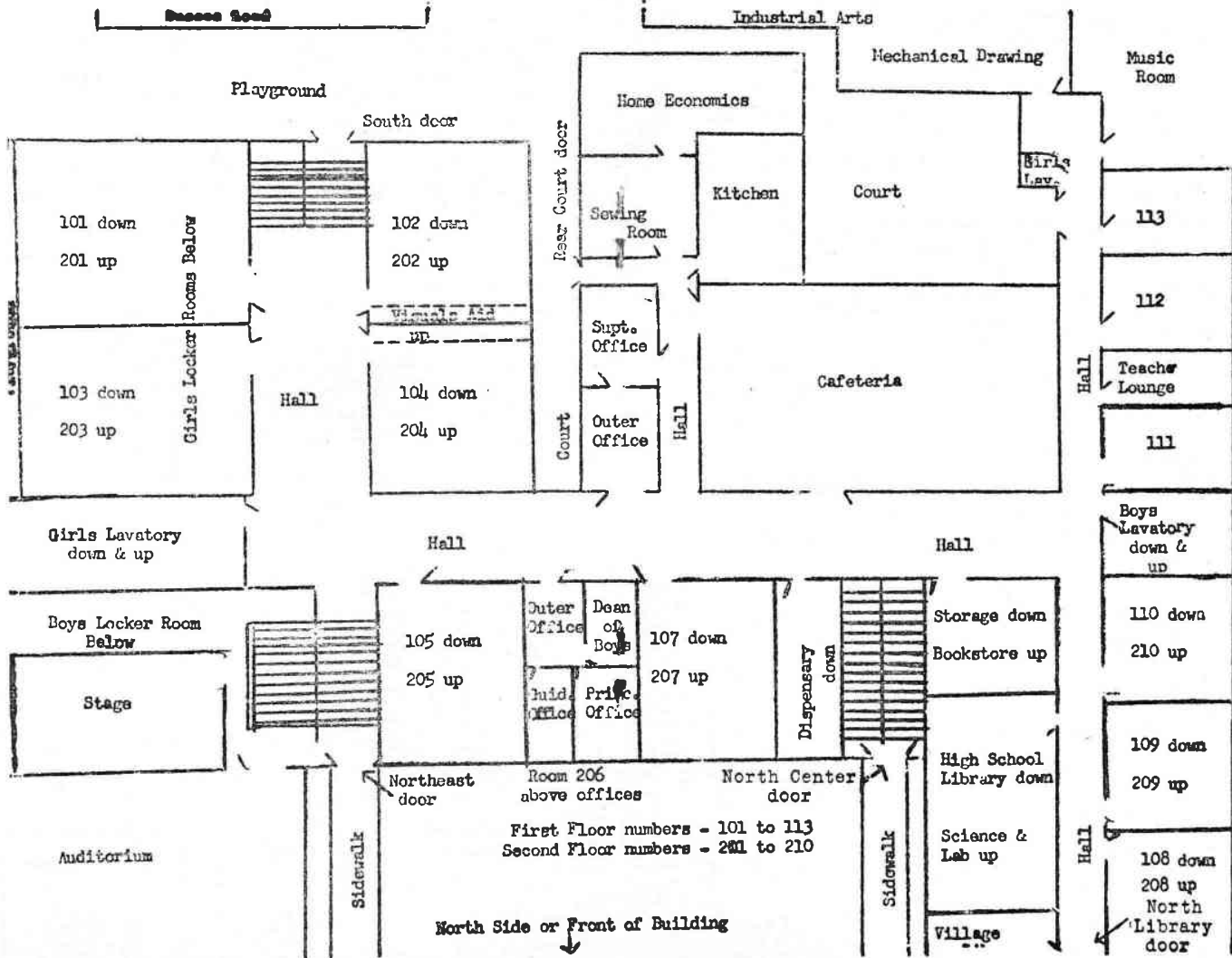
The finder of any article should take it to the outer part of the Principal's office and leave it with the office girls. Students who have lost articles are urged to come to the outer office and reclaim their loss upon identification.

FIRE DRILLS and EXITS

If weather permits, Brecksville School will have a fire drill at least once a month. Quick and orderly fire drills add much to the safety of our students in time of emergency.

In order to empty the building as quickly as possible, the following directions are to be followed:

1. Always regard the ringing of the fire gong as denoting danger.
2. Hurry, but do not run.
3. Do not talk until the bell is sounded to return to the building.
4. The teacher will leave the room last to make sure that no one is left behind and that the windows are closed.



5. The rooms which go out of the building first should proceed far enough down the sidewalk so that rooms which are out last will be the correct distance from the building.

6. Rooms are to exit in single file as follows:

Northeast Door—Rooms 103, 105, 203, 205, 206.

North Center Door—Cafeteria west of Main Hall door, Library, Laboratory, Rooms 110, 207, 210.

North Library Door—Science Room, Rooms 108, 109, 208, 209, 107A.

South Door—Rooms 101, 102, 104, 201, 202, 204.

Rear Court Door—Sewing Room, Cafeteria Section East of Main Hall Door, Room 107.

Music Room Door—Rooms 111, 112, 113 and Music Room.

Outside Shop Doors—Shop.

Gym—The exit to be used will be determined by the teacher in charge.

IMPORTANT MISCELLANEOUS ITEMS

1. Textbooks are supplied by the Board of Education. A charge will be made if the book is not cared for properly. They may be taken home for study.
2. Workbooks may be purchased at the bookstore.
3. Permission to use the building after supper must be secured from the Superintendent and booked through him. Use of the building after school must be scheduled through the Principal's office.
4. All class schedules and changes of the same must be made by the High School

Principal or persons designated by him.

5. Approval for all activities must be secured from the adviser of the organization before plans are made and events are scheduled through the Principal's office.
6. Before going to the Dispensary, permission must be obtained from the Principal's office.
7. Chewing of gum and the wearing of cleats on shoes in the building during school hours is forbidden. Cooperative students need not be reminded to comply.
8. Students' attire for school and all school functions should be in keeping with the goals of education. With this in mind, radical haircuts, low cut dresses or blouses, tight sweaters, sheer blouses, bermuda shorts, slacks on girls, blue jeans or levis and other trousers that do not hang over the hips, lack of belts, open shirts and other sloppy dress will not be permitted.
9. Students who attend school functions such as dances, games, etc., are expected to remain in attendance for the event. Continual going and coming will not be permitted.
10. Students are limited to one presidency or organization head and two other offices. Students who have received a "U" in Citizenship are not eligible to hold office unless the "U" has been balanced by an "O" from the teachers giving the "U" or by "O's" from two or more teachers. To be a candidate for an office, students must qualify by meeting the requirements.

TRADITIONS

Like all schools, Brecksville has certain annual events that through the years have become traditional.

The Christmas Formal, a project of the Seniors, is held during Christmas vacation. The Juniors give a dance to help raise funds for the Junior-Senior Prom, which is held in May.

Each Junior Class purchases a class ring with the adopted school crest on it. Sophomores select a uniform emblem to wear on their favorite jacket or sweater.

The Senior Class closes the school assembly program with Senior Assembly. Each year they have a Senior Night, especially for their family and relatives.

Senior awards such as the Kiwanis Scholarships, Student Council boy and girl Service Awards, Suburban Courier outstanding senior girl and boy athlete trophies, Womens' Club outstanding senior girl award and Senior Class high scholastic ranking senior boy and girl awards have added to the rich tradition of success of Brecksville High students.

These and many other school activities go into a grand book of memories of years spent in Brecksville High School.

CLASS MEETINGS

Class meetings shall be called by the president of the class with the consent of the class adviser. Class Advisers should always be present at the meetings unless excused by the Principal. Class meetings should be scheduled

far enough in advance to get the approval of the Principal.

SOCIAL FUNCTIONS

One of the purposes of the school is to promote a wholesome social life for the students. This can best be done if special affairs are arranged in advance and scheduled on the school calendar in the Principal's office. It is best that such affairs be held on Friday and Saturday nights. The class adviser should always be consulted in making such plans. Provisions for chaperons should be made through the class adviser.



Students in grades 7 and 8 are not permitted to attend evening high school dances except those after football or basketball games.

ORGANIZATION FUNDS and MINUTES

All class and club funds are banked by class or club treasurers through a central treasurer. Each class and club treasurer keeps a detailed record of all receipts and expenditures. His record is checked for accuracy once each month when a financial statement is prepared by the central treasurer. Any discrepancies are ironed out at this time by the class or club treasurer and the central treasurer. Both the central treasurer's and class and club treasurer's books will be audited each summer.

Payment out of class or club funds is by requisition. The requisition is a statement of the bill to be paid, and contains the signature of the class or club president, treasurer, adviser,

superintendent and principal.

Minutes of the club, class or organization are on file in the Principal's office for authorized people to use. Before summer dismissal of school, each secretary must see to it that the minutes are given to the Principal. Treasurers' books are to be turned in to the central treasurer.

ART CLUB

Open to students in grades 9 through 12 who desire to further develop artistic ability and appreciation.

ATHLETICS

Brecksville is proud of the athletic record made by its teams. To represent Brecksville in interscholastic competition, a student must meet the following requirements:

1. He shall have passed in at least three subjects at the end of the preceding semester.
2. He shall have had a passing mark in at least three subjects up to the close of the week preceding the contest.
3. He shall have the written consent of the parent, which relieves the school and the Board of Education of any responsibility in case of injury.
4. He shall have a doctor's certificate of physical fitness for athletic competition.
5. He shall maintain a standard of conduct that will not reflect discredit upon the school and he must adhere to training rules laid down by the Coach.

The granting of a school letter signifies that the wearer has proven himself willing to cooperate at all times with his team-mates and his instructor to the point of sacrificing his own ambitions for the welfare of the group. Letters are presented to those who qualify in football, basketball, track, baseball, wrestling, tennis, G.A.A., and marching band. Cheerleaders and majorettes are also awarded letters.

Pep meetings will be held as requested by the coaches.

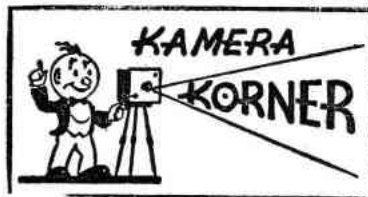
BEE HIVE

BOOSTER'S CLUB

As the name implies, the Booster's Club is organized to boost and promote worth-while school activities. It carries on campaigns, ticket sales and assists in every way possible to maintain good school spirit. Membership is open to grades 9-12.

CAMERA CLUB



The Camera Club is for the benefit of high school students who are interested in photography.

The members do their own developing and printing in the darkroom. Other club activities are photo contests and picture taking excursions. Membership is open to high school students interested in this kind of work.

DRAMATICS CLUB

The Dramatics Club is an organization for students in grades 9 through 12 who are interested in learning about either the technical or acting parts of play production. A one-act play is to be produced for an assembly. Two larger productions will be staged for the public.

FUTURE NURSES CLUB

The aim of the F.N.C. is helping acquaint girls interested in nursing with the profession. Speakers, field trips and study of the traits and responsibilities of nursing is the chief function of the Club.

FUTURE TEACHERS of AMERICA

The F.T.A. is an organization open to all students in the upper four classes who are interested in teaching. Students are given some experience in teaching through the club. Dues are 50c a year.

G. A. A.

G. A. A. is an abbreviation for Girl's Athletic Association. The organization is open to all 9th through 12th grade girls who wish to join in various intramural sports. The dues are 50c a school year. A member receives her school letter after attaining 600 points.

GIRL'S LEADERS CLUB

The Leaders Club is an organization for girls in the upper three grades who excel in athletics and possess leadership qualities. The Club usually contains no more than 12 girls. New members are selected by the old members.

The Leaders help in gym classes and also referee in G. A. A. A letter is awarded for one year of faithful service. Meetings are held as arranged.

HY-BREEZE

The Hy-Breeze is the official school paper. It is your source of news about activities of the school along with light bi-weekly gossip and humor.

A letter is given for two years of service as a reporter, or two years as a typist. Meetings are to be arranged. Membership is open to grades 9-12.

KEY CLUB

The Key Club is a service organization for boys in grades 10, 11 and 12. It is affiliated with the local Kiwanis Club.

MARCHING BAND

Membership is open to grades 9-12. The marching band provides shows during half-time of the football games, and music for pep meetings and other school affairs and civic functions. Awards are given for participation.
